2.1. Developing a Curriculum for Open Science

Matt McGregor, Cameron McLean and I led a workshop at the eResearch Symposium in March 2015. There is increased interest in pushing the curriculum development for open science at different levels within the University of Auckland. The project will provide upskilling for researchers so that they can exploit the opportunities offered by the digital environment. I met with the advisory board of the Centre for eResearch and with the CLEAR group that provides staff professional development. The project continues to work closely with NeSI and Software Carpentry.
